

In August Wilson's American classic, Troy Maxson, a former star baseball player, is excluded from the major leagues, as a Black man. He is deemed 'too old' to play by the time the Majors begin admitting Black athletes. Troy's bitterness takes its toll on his relationships with his son, who now wants his own chance to become a football star, and his wife, who reevaluates their marriage when Troy comes home with secret that changes their lives. ## **ABOUT THE AUTHORS**

August Wilson: Playwright | (1945-2005) authored Gem of the Ocean, Joe Turner's Come and Gone, Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, The Piano Lesson, Seven Guitars, Fences, Two Trains Running, Jitney, King Hedley II and Radio Golf. These works explore the heritage and experience of African Americans, decade by decade, over the course of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Goodman Theatre was the first in the country to have produced every play in Mr. Wilson's cycle. In 2003, Mr. Wilson made his professional stage debut in his one-man show How I Learned What I Learned. Mr. Wilson's work garnered many awards, including Pulitzer Prizes for Fences (1987) and The Piano Lesson (1990); a Tony Award for Fences; Great Britain's Olivier Award for Jitney; as well as seven New York Drama Critics Circle Awards for Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, Fences, Joe Turner's Come and

Gone, The Piano Lesson, Two Trains Running, Seven Guitars and Jitney. Additionally, the cast recording of Ma Rainey's Black Bottom received a 1985 Grammy Award and Mr. Wilson received a 1995 Emmy Award nomination for his screenplay adaptation of The Piano Lesson. Mr. Wilson's early works include the one-act plays The Janitor, Recycle, The Coldest Day of the Year, Malcolm X, The Homecoming and the musical satire Black Bart and the Sacred Hills. Mr. Wilson received many fellowships and awards, including Rockefeller and Guggenheim Fellowships in Playwriting, the Whiting Writers' Award, the 2003 Heinz Award, a 1999 National Humanities Medal by the President of the United States and numerous honorary degrees from colleges and universities, as well as the only high school diploma ever issued by the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh. He was an alumnus of New Dramatists, a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and a 1995 inductee into the American Academy of Arts and Letters. October 16, 2005, Broadway renamed the theater located at 245 West 52<sup>nd</sup> Street the August Wilson Theatre. Mr. Wilson was born and raised in the Hill District of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and lived in Seattle, Washington, at the time of his death. He is survived by his two daughters, Sakina Ansari and Azula Carmen Wilson, and his wife, costume designer Constanza Romero.



Wambui Richardson: Director || is the Artistic Director of Jubilee Theatre. Richardson brings to Jubilee Theatre and the DFW area more than 20 years of experience in all levels of the Black theatre community, as well as in the theatre industry in general, having served as a director, playwright, art's educator, and executive leader. Formerly residing in Baltimore, and a native of New Orleans, Richardson was a freelance director, resident teaching artist for Baltimore Center Stage, and the executive director of academies for the National Academy Foundation School of Baltimore. He has also worked with the St. Louis Black Repertory Theatre, WordBridge Playwright's Laboratory, Syracuse Stage, Abington Theatre (Off-Off Broadway), and Rattlestick Playwrights Theatre (Off-Broadway) and is a proud member of the Drama League. Some of Richardson's directorial credits include: Sugar Mouth Sam Don't Dance Here No More (Off Broadway) Les

Liaisons Dangereuse (Syracuse Stage), A Stronger Soul Within a Finer Frame (Touring Production for St. Louis Black), F.E.M.A 1603 (world premiere), Zooman & the Sign, In the Blood, Every Tongue Confess, The Seagull, Measure for Measure, Truth Stands (East Coast Premiere), The Face of Emmett Till. Richardson's Jubilee credits include: Sistas, The Musical, N, Berta, Berta, Southern Boys, To Be Young Gifted & Black, Hoo Doo Love, Over 40, Dreamgirls.

### PARKING + POLICIES

Parking has significantly changed in downtown Fort Worth. We are no longer able to validate valet or the parking lot directly across the street.
